From preparing residents for careers in the construction trades to technical training, Chevron is committed to helping connect local residents to the programs that will transform their lives.

Regional Occupational Program (ROP)

ROP is a free job readiness course offered through a partnership with Chevron and the Contra Costa County Office of Education that helps prepare students for a job in energy, petrochemical and related industries. Students will learn the basic processes and equipment common to the industry and have an opportunity to make connections with local employers including the Richmond Refinery. The courses also help develop strong communication and teamwork skills, and job safety is emphasized throughout.

Chevron works to promote an inclusive business environment in the Richmond area and build long-term relationships with local companies to support our local operations.

Goebel Construction

In the early 1980s, Richmond-based Goebel Construction received its first contract with the Richmond Refinery for paving and road work. The company started with a paving crew of six and today has more than 100 mostly Richmond-area employees doing paving, grading, underground and mechanical work, steelwork, and environmental remediation at the refinery. Greg Goebel Jr. oversees the work the company does for the refinery and says his company grew in part because it adheres to Chevron's high safety standards. "The work and safety culture that Chevron has helped breed within our company has a positive impact on our other business, outside of the refinery. It's a good resume-builder with other clients, saying, 'This is our safety record.'"



helping families prosper

Chevron supports programs that help families overcome every day obstacles, such as the lack of a healthy home environment, that are acting as a barrier to economic success.

Family Sustainability Project

Thanks to a unique partnership between the Community Energy Services Corporation and the Prescott-Joseph Center (see Q&A on page 5), families in North Richmond now have access to vital health services. The Family Sustainability Project is a holistic program that addresses issues of chronic unemployment and economic hardship around housing and access to quality healthcare. Funded through a grant from Chevron, the program adopts a comprehensive approach to address the cycle of poverty. The program includes visits by the Breathmobile® to schools and childcare centers throughout the North Richmond community to provide much-needed free healthcare access for students with respiratory illness.

a conversation with

Dr. Washington Burns Executive Director, Prescott-Joseph Center



What is your background and training?

I moved to the East Bay in the 1940s, attended Oakland Technical High School and then UC Berkeley. I eventually earned my medical degree from the University of Buffalo (New York). For 34 years I was the medical director for the clinical lab at California Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco. I've been the Executive Director of the Prescott-Joseph Center for 20 years. We administer the Breathmobile program.

Why are health care providers concerned about treating kids with asthma?

Asthma is a major health issue in the East Bay and Contra Costa County. It particularly affects low income people, most especially African-Americans and Latinos. But anyone can have it. Unlike most other chronic diseases it is very manageable and people can live productive lives.

What is the Breathmobile?

The Breathmobile is a totally free specialized, high-tech asthma clinic on wheels. So the whole purpose is to bring asthma care and treatment to children and their families. We evaluate each patient individually and develop a personalized care and asthma action plan that is unique to their needs. We also have interpreters available for patients and families who do not speak English.

How does the Breathmobile treat asthma?

We work with patients to help educate them on asthma triggers, how to use medication, how to use inhalers. We also conduct home inspections if necessary to eradicate asthma triggers in the home. This is something that isn't happening as much in the traditional doctor's office appointment.

Does the program work?

Our results are outstanding. For the patients that come to the Breathmobile and follow their recommended action plan, in three months we can have their asthma under control. This fulfills our mission to keep kids out of the ER and in school.

What is your experience working with Chevron?

We are about hope and making an impact on the lives of community residents. And that's what the Breathmobile is doing. And we do it all at no cost to the patient. Chevron believes in what we do and they have been a supporter of our efforts to reduce asthma in our community.

What other services are provided to treat asthma? We also work with Community Energy Services Corporation to conduct home inspections. It's really important to get asthma triggers out of the home. That might be mold, animal dander, roaches or rodents. You have to clean that up to effectively control the asthma.

How has the area changed over the years?

Over the years, gradually the middle class has moved out of the urban centers – leaving a large percentage of the people abandoned. One of the things people need to know is that folks care about them. And that's what we are trying to do.
